Pastoral Letter - November 2023 - "Who Is Carrying Us?"

As many of you know, I have been traveling to New Haven every Wednesday to help teach a course in preaching at Yale Divinity School. As I sat at the classroom, I felt like traveling in a time machine, as I was sitting there as a student back in 2007 and 2008. As I went to the bathroom to wash my face and looked at myself in the mirror, I could not believe fifteen years have passed. Now, I am working as a full-time pastor. I have my family—wife, two boys, and, of course, our newly adopted puppy, Sabrina.

When you hear the word "Yale," some of you might be impressed with the academic value of its name. When I got the admission letter to their master's program in 2007, I was thrilled and walked around the streets in Boston, shouting, "I am going to Yale!" At first, I was full of excitement and dreams. But they quickly turned to frustration and low self-esteem. I thought that I had been an excellent student but soon discovered that I was nothing special compared with other brilliant students all gathered there.

My first semester? My academic performance was much lower than what I expected. When I sat with my academic advisor to complain about my mediocre grades, she responded, "Bob, do you know where you are right now? You are at Yale." I do not believe that it was her intention, but her response made me feel like I did not belong there. I had been planning to apply for a doctoral program, but I felt the door had been closed. I struggled with the lack of appetite and many sleepless nights.

One day, I got a call from Rev. Gregory Groover, pastor of Charles St A.M.E. Church in Roxbury, MA. I had been acquainted with him as he once invited me to come to his church and preach. (I felt very humbled to preach as a seminary student at a historic black church in Boston). He was coming to New Haven for a ministry conference and wanted to have lunch with me. As I shared what a failure I was, he looked at me and said, "Bob, Christ does not call you to be perfect. But he calls you to be faithful."

At that moment, I felt like my huge burden was lifted off of me. I thought that my future depended on how well I would perform academically. I thought that my value was determined by my success and achievement. However, Rev. Groover reminded me that I belonged to Christ, who had always been carrying me in his arms. My self-worth did not come from how I was perceived by others who would praise me or criticize me. Instead, my worth comes from Christ, who calls me his beloved child.

Indeed, God opened an unexpected door for me. Out of several schools that offered me both admission and scholarship, I decided to come back to Boston University, as I was offered a position as associate pastor at Belmont UMC. Well, my failures did not stop there. I submitted my dissertation proposal, which was rejected by the supervising committee twice. I wrestled with my ministries, dealing with church conflicts. I applied for the ordination and was rejected twice, again. And yet, I always remembered the words of Rev. Groover. "It's not about you. It is about Christ who calls you to be faithful."

As I sit at the table with the students this fall, I see many brilliant faces with so much intelligence and a bright future ahead of them, or so I thought. I was surprised to hear their stories of struggles – depression, relationships, family, and uncertainty of vocation. I listen to them and offer my experiences and prayers for them. Now, I am grateful to God for these failures in my life so that "the power of Christ may dwell in me" (2 Corinthians 7:9). Just like the poem "Footprints in the Sand," I believe that it is Christ who carries us all on his back, even when we feel isolated and abandoned. And I pray that no matter what struggles you are going through today, you are not alone. Christ is carrying you on his back.

A Statement of Inclusivity, consistent with the beliefs of our denomination and its Book of Discipline, created by the Council and posted on the church web site in the Who We Are page, is below.

All Are Welcome at Aldersgate

As a United Methodist congregation, we affirm that all persons are individuals of sacred worth, created in the image of God. We affirm that we are an open, welcoming, fully accepting congregation supportive of all, regardless of age, race, nationality, ethnic background, gender, sexuality, ability, and physical appearance. In agreement with our New England Conference Open Spirit Task Force, we are committed to safeguarding the sacred worth and dignity of all persons in our churches and communities, including those who identify as LGBTQI+ persons.

We are a church that supports every individual's full participation in the life, ministry, sacraments, membership, and leadership of the church at any level. We celebrate the blessings of gender and cultural diversity in our pastors and leadership team.

Inclusion Discussions FAQs

Several people have asked questions about the inclusivity discussions that have been sponsored by the Church Council. We thought it would be helpful to answer some of the more common questions here.

Q: Why are we having these conversations now?

A: Recently, some members of the congregation expressed disappointment that, while the United Methodist Church (UMC) denomination's bylaws have continued to restrict pastors from being openly gay or from officiating same-sex weddings, Aldersgate has not been openly proactive in supporting people from marginalized sectors of society, including the LGBTQI+ community. These concerns have motivated church leaders to invite the congregation to discuss Jesus' call to love all.

Q: What has Aldersgate done about these concerns?

A: The Church Council created a Statement of Inclusion that is posted on the "About Us" page of the church web site under the "Who We Are" section. During the summer, Pastor Bob's sermons addressed the theme of Inclusion. In September, there were four information sessions where Pastor Bob, Maylis, Bonnie Marden, and Peter Smyton described the denomination's stance, our New England Conference's position, and what Aldersgate is currently doing. In October, a Prayer Wall was created on a rolling partition in the Fellowship Hall where you are invited to post prayers for what the church will become as a result of these discussions. On October 29, a series of small group discussions was held. We invite further ideas about how to continue to be in conversation and practice "Radical Hospitality" to everyone who enters our building.

Q: Can members of the LGBTQI+ community receive Communion and have their funeral at a United Methodist church like Aldersgate?

A: Yes, members of the LGBTQI+ community can receive Communion, and be baptized and have their funeral at United Methodist churches, including Aldersgate. The current restriction on pastors is limited to officiating non-heterosexual weddings.

Q: I heard the church was egged recently and it was because of these conversations. Is that true?

A: The church was egged but there is no indication it was because of these conversations. These conversations have been internal to the congregation, and it is unlikely a member is the culprit. It was only two eggs, with minimal clean-up necessary, and it appears to have been a one-time, random act. The police are investigating but have no reason to believe it was in response to anything that occurs at Aldersgate.


Q: What is the next step? What can I do?

A: We are looking for further ways to continue the dialog and become an even more inclusive and welcoming congregation. There has been some discussion of displaying some visible symbol to the community to show we are welcoming despite the media's portrayal of the denomination. We invite ideas about how we can continue to be in conversation. If you have suggestions or thoughts to share, please contact Pastor Bob or Peter Smyton, Council chairperson.

Middlesex Community College Student Receives Aldersgate Scholarship

Last spring, the Mighty Men's group of Aldersgate established a scholarship in the church's name at Middlesex Community College (MCC). The funds had been raised via a series of golf tournaments several years ago and had grown through investments to \$8000. The scholarship of \$1000/year is to be given to a deserving BIPOC – black, indigenous, or person of color – student each fall until the funds expire. This fall, the MCC selection committee selected Ibrahim Konteh as the first recipient of the Aldersgate UMC Scholarship! Ibrahim is majoring in Information Technology – Cyber Security. He received his award certificate at a ceremony at MCC on October 24, with Pastor Bob and Peter Smyton in attendance to present Ibrahim with his award. Congrats Ibrahim! A special thanks to Dawn Jones who served as an evaluator of the applicants for MCC.




Advent Study Begins December 3rd

This year, we take a deeper look at a children's book that delights all ages in the Christmas season.

The Heart That Grew Three Sizes: Finding Faith in the Story of the Grinch by Matt Rawle will be the Advent material for the Adults AND some of the kids Sunday School classes.

Rediscover the gift of Advent that comes without packages, ribbons, and bows. We don't know why the Grinch hated Christmas. We just know he did. If we're being honest, there's probably something within the Christmas season celebration that awakens a Grinch within all of us. Maybe the gift we unwrap was all wrong, or memories that were supposed to be joyful never were. When everything seems wrong in the world, even joyful celebrations are much too loud. We don't know why the Grinch hated Christmas. We just know he did. In this new Advent study, Matt Rawle explores the faith themes in the Christmas



classic, *How the Grinch Stole Christmas!* including, how did the Grinch's heart grow three sizes come Christmas morning? How did Christmas save the Grinch? Could it be that the very thing we think we hate is the one thing that changes our lives? This Advent and Christmas season, look at a familiar classic through the lens of faith and see how Christ speaks to us through our culture.

There will be a video and discussion each week.


