Pastoral Letter for December 2023 "Finding Home"

Home. What a wonderful word! It is a word that instantly creates feelings of warmth, coziness, and relaxation for many of us. It is a word mentioned more often when Christmas approaches. Families gather for the meal on the table. Young people from colleges come home excited to see their parents and siblings. Little children rush downstairs to find their gifts under the Christmas tree. Family members gather around the fireplace with marshmallows in one hand and hot cocoa in the other hand. Grandmother tells the stories to her grandchildren while knitting. And grandfather snoring on his rocking chair. At least, that is the image that comes to my mind when we say "home," especially in the Christmas season. We feel secure and comfortable at home.

While the home provides a sense of security, comfort, and peace for many of us, there are also many who do not share the same feelings. Several years ago, when my wife was pregnant with Joshua, her nurse called her regarding her pregnancy. The nurse asked her, "Do you suffer any physical, emotional, or sexual abuse from your spouse?" As Sungha answered, "Of course not," her nurse said something that shocked her. "I wish there were more women who can answer the same." There are many who find their home far from the place of safety, comfort, and rest. There are also many who flee their homes globally in search of a new home. According to statistics by the U.N., there are at least 89.3 million people who fled their homes today, and many of them are minors under the age of 18.

I know that many of us may not want to talk about such a topic as refugees, asylum seekers, or migrants when Christmas is a time to celebrate our family, gifts, and home. However, the nativity story tells us that Jesus was also a refugee whose family was forced to live in a foreign land. After the three magi did not come back to tell him where the Messiah had been born, Herod became furious and ordered his soldiers to kill all the children in and around Bethlehem who were two years old or under. Having been warned in his dream, Joseph took Jesus and Mary, escaped to Egypt, and stayed there until Herod died. As an immigrant myself, I can imagine that Joseph and Mary struggled with the foreign language and culture, trying to get any jobs they could find and raising their newborn son.

In response to such a global crisis, United Methodist Church encourages its members to "commit ourselves as a Church to the achievement of a world community that is a fellowship of persons who honestly love one another" (¶ 165). We are invited to share the resources of the world to "provide basic needs such as food, clothing, shelter, education, health care, and other necessities" (¶ 165). I am glad that the church council of Aldersgate UMC attempts to live out such a spirit of hospitality, justice, and love for our migrating neighbors by supporting New Refuge and Immigrant Resettlement Fund by Greater Lowell Community Foundation. This fund will support those in need with "housing, employment, transportation, food, acculturation, and other related assistance."

Christmas is a season that Christ came and found a home on this earth. In a world filled with oppression, violence, and tragedy, Christ came to his people as "Emmanuel" – God is with us. When

people felt alienated from the presence of God in their suffering, Christ was born as a meek baby, bringing the message of peace and hope, meeting people where they were. He found a home on this earth, calling Joseph his father, and Mary his mother. He grew up wonderfully being loved by his parents, siblings, and neighbors in his hometown. But he also revealed how far our "home" is from the "Home" revealed in the kingdom of God where strangers are welcomed, sinners are forgiven, and death is conquered.

May we also find our home where the joy and peace of God overflows and also help to create a home for others whom God loves as God's precious children.

Inclusion Discussions

We continue to be in dialog on how we as a church family can be more inclusive to all regardless of age, race, nationality, ethnic background, gender, sexuality, ability, and physical appearance. The Council discussed next steps at our last meeting and heard from those who facilitated our small group listening conversations in late October. One of the facilitators, Charles McCrea, provided the following perspective that the Council affirmed and agreed to share with the congregation:

Over the course of the past several months the congregation has engaged in conversations on how it might be more welcoming and inclusive of all persons, most especially the LGBTQI+ persons.

These conversations have taken the form of small groups, informal conversations, open forums in the fellowship hall and Zoom meetings.

The conversations have been open, informative and in many instances heartfelt and personal. They have served to increase our awareness and understanding of some of the needs and challenges of various marginalized communities. Additionally, they have also highlighted our need as a faith community to be more intentional in how we welcome and disciple all of God's children.

As a faith community, for more than sixty years Aldersgate has welcomed the mainstream and marginalized, young and old, singles and families, those born in this country and those who are immigrants; those of differing ethnicities; and those of various socio-economic stations.

This church has sought to live out being 'the church with the warm heart.'

Some who raised this challenged us as a faith community to do more.

After thoughtful discussions and prayer, there is more which we can do.

We will embark upon a church-wide effort to increase our collective awareness of how we live out and fulfill the greatest and second commandments and the Great Commission. They are God's command to love God and love one another; and Jesus Christ's command to make disciples of all persons.

We will use Scripture, sermons, adult and youth education, small and large groups and other methods and means to understand what it means to welcome and disciple all who come to our church seeking.

It is our sincere hope that this church-wide undertaking will move Aldersgate even further along in its commitment to live out our command to love God and love one another.

Our hope and fervent prayer is not only will all persons feel and be welcomed here but having experienced the love of Jesus Christ through contact with any and all of us that they will not leave

here as they came. And we in turn will be better able and equipped to live out our faith beyond the church walls.

We will have lots of fun playing games, decorating cookies and making a craft.






"Rediscover the gift of Advent that comes without packages, ribbons, and bows. We don't know why the Grinch hated Christmas. We just know he did. If we're being honest, there's probably something within the Christmas season celebration that awakens a Grinch within all of us. Maybe the gift we unwrap was all wrong, or memories that were supposed to be joyful never were. When everything seems wrong in the world, even joyful celebrations are much too loud. We don't know why the Grinch hated Christmas. We just know he did. In this new Advent study, Matt Rawle explores the faith themes in the Christmas



classic, How the Grinch Stole Christmas! including, how did the Grinch's heart grow three sizes come Christmas morning? How did Christmas save the Grinch? Could it be that the very thing we think we hate is the one thing that changes our lives? This Advent and Christmas season, look at a familiar classic through the lens of faith and see how Christ speaks to us through our culture."

"Can Persons Who Forget God, Know God? Can one who forgets who Jesus is be a Christian disciple?


Dementia diseases represent a crisis of faith for many family members and congregations. Magnifying this crisis is the way people with dementia tend to be objectified by both medical and religious communities. They are recipients of treatment and projects for mission. Ministry is done

to and for them rather than with them.

While acknowledging the devastation of dementia diseases, Ken Carder draws on his own experience as a caregiver, hospice chaplain, and pastoral practitioner to portray the gifts as well as the challenges accompanying dementia diseases. He confronts the deep personal and theological questions created by loving people with dementia diseases, demonstrating how living with dementia can be a means of growing in faith, wholeness, and ministry for the entire community of faith. He also reveals that authentic faith transcends intellectual beliefs, verbal affirmations, and prescribed practices. Carder asserts that the Judeo-Christian tradition offers a broader lens, defining personhood in relationship to God's story and humanity's participation in God's mighty acts of creation and new creation; thereby contributing to hope, community, and self-worth.

Pastors and congregations will be better equipped to minister with people affected by dementia, receiving their gifts and responding to their unique needs. They will learn how people with dementia contribute to the community and the church's life and mission, discovering practical ways those contributions can be identified, nurtured, and incorporated into the church's life and ministry."

"In this classic theological work, acclaimed theologian and religious leader Howard Thurman demonstrates how the gospel may be read as a manual of resistance for the poor and disenfranchised. Jesus is a partner in the pain of the oppressed, Thurman writes. The example of Jesus' life of suffering, pain, and overwhelming love offers a solution that ends our descent into moral nihilism. Although Jesus was scorned and forced to live outside society, he advocated a love of self and others that defeats fear and the hatred that destroys our souls and the world around us. Jesus and the Disinherited reaches past anger and distrust toward a vision of unity.

Howard Thurman (1900–1981) was the first black dean of Marsh Chapel at Boston University and cofounder of the Church for the Fellowship of All Peoples in San Francisco, California, the first interracially copastored church in America. Life magazine called him one of the great preachers of the 20th century, and Thurman was a spiritual adviser to Martin Luther King Jr."
