Pastoral Letter – April 2024 "God's Laughter"

A couple of weeks ago, I visited Vern at Lahey Hospital. He was recovering from the vascular surgery he had a day ago. As I sat next to him, he gave me a small bag with some Froot Loops. The label said, "The Seeds of Donut." Its description said, "If you dig about ten feet deep and place these seeds, you will harvest the donuts." I chuckled and laughed with both Vern and Betty together. I appreciated his sense of humor even when he was stuck in the hospital, dealing with pain and exhaustion.

You may notice that I often share some humorous stories during my sermons. My wife is amazed to see people at Aldersgate laugh during my sermon because she says, "When you say jokes in Korean, you are not that funny." Well, I do not know if my English has finally gotten better than Korean. Praise God! However, I usually give thanks to God for the generosity of Aldersgate people who are willing to laugh at the poor jokes of their pastor. Thank you always for the love and care for your pastor ©

Many people often believe that church is a place with people who are always serious about their faith and strict about the code of their behaviors. Children, don't make noises. Strangers, don't sit at the pew where my three generations have been sitting. Keep your straight face and present your best-self while you are at the church. After all, Reinhold Niebuhr, one of the most influential theologians in the 20th century, argued that humor does not belong to the serious business of faith when "the ultimate issues are raised."

However, in *Divine* Laughter, the authors Karl Jacobson and Rolf Jacobson insist, "The Bible is frequently funny, and we should let it be what it is." Despite the historical, cultural, and contextual gap between us and the people in the Bible, we often encounter stories where we can laugh at the surprise, joy, ridicule, or foolishness. When Abraham and Sarah were told they would bear a child in their old age, they laughed at the absurdity of such news or maybe out of their pain. In his duel with the prophets of Baal and Asherah, he looked at them performing a ritual for rain for hours and laughed, "Cry aloud! Maybe your god is on a vacation or sleeping."

And there is Jesus. Although the Bible does not tell us that "Jesus laughed," we can imagine he was smiling and laughing when the sick were healed and shared joy with their families. He was laughing when he took children "up in his arms, laid his hands on them, and blessed them" (Mark 10:16). Some people justify their rights to be angry with others, pointing to the evil and injustice in our world. They highlight how Jesus was also angry with the temple practices that exploited the poor and marginalized and overturned the tables. However, Willis Wheatley envisioned Jesus as one who laughs as he announced the good news of God's love to

the sorrowful, disinherited, oppressed. Therefore, the title of his drawing is called "Christ, the Liberator."

As many people will share and post jokes for April Fools' Day, I believe that the greatest joke for the world is the resurrection of Christ. Death could not keep him in the tomb. He arose, therefore proving that "nothing will be impossible with God" (Luke 1:37). So, do not lose laughter as you face challenges, hardships, or difficulties today, especially for the sake of the gospel. Even when the powers, authorities, and principalities seem to prevail, having their claim on the lives of others, God laughs and says, "You fool! Do you really think you are in control?" (Psalm 2:4)

Update on Aldersgate Scholarship to Middlesex Community College

Last year, the Mighty Men's group gave \$8000 to Middlesex Community College (MCC) to establish the Aldersgate United Methodist Church Scholarship. The scholarship's purpose is to provide a \$1000 award each year to a BIPOC – black, indigenous, or person of color – recipient to further their education. The first AUMC Scholarship was awarded last fall to Ibrahim Konteh, a cybersecurity major. We learned that, if our scholarship fund reached \$20,000, the scholarship could be awarded annually in perpetuity since MCC's investment account guarantees a 5% return (so \$20K earns \$1K annually). At the March Church Council meeting, the Council unanimously agreed to provide \$12,600 of the \$15,000 2023 income earned by our Endowment Fund to MCC to reach the \$20,000 goal of the scholarship fund. (See more information about the Endowment Fund elsewhere in this Advocate.) Representatives from MCC will attend worship on April 7 to receive and celebrate this gift with us.

We are looking to add to our friendly team of volunteers who live-stream and record our worship services. We take turns so everyone gets an opportunity to participate. We schedule the two-person crew weekly based on everyone's availability. Training is provided. New Composting Bin

Aldersgate now has a curbside collection service for food scraps. The 13-gallon green compost bin is stored in the kitchen. It will be picked up by Black Earth Compost every other Wednesday. In return, we'll receive a 40-pound bag of finished compost for the garden each year. This is a great way for us to reduce our trash, diverting organic waste from the incinerator into nutrients for the soil.

What can go in the bin? There's a detailed list of acceptable items on the lid. Any food scraps are okay, including meat and dairy. Also paper products, like napkins and paper towels, that have been used with food only (not for blowing nose or cleaning with chemicals). Most paper plates, cups and plastic ware are NOT compostable. Only BPI, CMA, or OK COMPOST certified products are acceptable (see the logos on the list). The most important thing is to keep out any contaminants, like fruit stickers, plastic, and non-certified paper products. If in doubt, stick to just food scraps. Please "snap" the lid shut when you're finished.




We each know and want to fulfill the Great Commandment. But what does it mean to love your neighbor as yourself? Do we have to love even if we believe different things, disagree or are polar opposites? How do we do that? How do we do it well? If we are not loving our neighbor well, are we not loving God with our whole heart?

Here at Aldersgate, we want to encourage each other to seek and find God with our whole hearts and to be His loving hands and feet. Let's come together to explore how to love like Jesus in a world that likes to fight, cancel, and exclude those different from ourselves.

In Sunday and Thursday classes, small groups, in our homes, at church, over dinner or Zoom, let's come together as a body for five weeks and explore these questions and grow closer in oneness and unity. We want to create an opportunity to join hearts and minds with this book looking at how the church can have unity during a time of rampant disagreement on all manner of things.

We especially would like this to be our focus this spring because General Conference meets on April 23 – May 3, and together we can pray and support Bonnie Marden and the rest of our New England delegation as they navigate some tough issues facing our denomination. It is our hope the experience of reading this book, together, will knit us closer together and deepen our church family's connections with one another, as well as spur us on to love our neighbors and love God better.





Our ONE focus will take place from April 1 to May 30.

Order a copy of the book or get one here at church, and then sign up for a discussion group. Each week we will gather to watch a short video and discuss a couple chapters. Our goal is to offer a variety of dates and times so that everyone who wants to participate can find a good time and location to join in. Some groups will have a Zoom option as well. For those who can't meet each week, we will hold a book club type discussion of the whole book.

We have three morning groups and two weeknight groups scheduled. From the Publisher- ONE – Unity in a Divided World by Deidra Riggs. Update from the Endowment Committee

In 2023, the Endowment Fund grew by \$331,907 from gifts, interest, and market change. The balance of the Endowment Fund on December 31, 2023, was \$433,640. The Endowment Committee met on January 24, 2024, and recommended a distribution of \$15,000 which is a portion of the earnings for 2023. Per the Endowment Fund charter, these earnings may be used for missions or long-term property projects. The Finance Committee made this recommendation to the Church Council. After reviewing multiple proposals, the Council decided to use \$12,600 to fund the Aldersgate UMC Scholarship Fund at Middlesex Community College (MCC) which increases the scholarship fund to \$20,000. With this donation, the scholarship will now generate a \$1,000 per year in perpetuity to be given to a deserving BIPOC – black, indigenous, or person of color – student each fall. Representatives of MCC will be accepting this donation at the worship services on April 7. The remaining \$2,400 of the Endowment distribution will be used for a facility project identified by the Trustees at their next meeting.

At the end of July 2023, the church received a bequest of \$298,435 from the estate of Nancy Goodick which was designated to the Endowment Fund. On August 13, 2023, a special Church Conference was convened and the bequest was accepted.

Additional gifts may be made to the Endowment Fund at any time. Any gifts to the fund will make a greater long-term investment to the financial health and well-being of the missions and property of Aldersgate. We are truly blessed by the generosity of our church family!


CHURCH SCHOOL NEWS GREEN SUNDAY!

He is the recipient of the Donna Nagel Award for his contributions to the field of General Music from the

Massachusetts Music Educators Association and the Spotlight Award from the American Center for Elemental Music and Movement.
