NE Conference Guidance Regarding Local Church Engagements with ICE

As a result of recent events, the Methodist denomination, along with many other religious denominations, has issued guidance on how local churches should interact with ICE officers. The Church Council wants to ensure the congregation is aware of this guidance. The New England Conference has a web page with resources at

<https://www.neumc.org/immigrant> that includes material from a webinar describing the rights and recommended responses to ICE engagements, along with checklists and other useful information that is periodically updated. You will see signage in the church building designating private areas that would require a warrant signed by a judge – not signed by an immigration agent – for ICE officers to enter. Staff and ushers will receive training on how to respond to ICE interactions, with an emphasis on knowing our rights, dealing peacefully with ICE officials, and de-escalating any confrontations.

We encourage the congregation to use these resources to understand how to engage with ICE, both within the church building and out in the community. At a minimum, you have the following constitutional rights:

- Do not open a door if an immigration agent is knocking at the door unless they have a valid warrant to enter signed by a judge
- Do not answer any questions from an agent - you have the right to remain silent
- Do not sign anything

If you want to understand the difference between a judicial warrant signed by a judge and an administrative warrant signed by ICE, or have any other questions or concerns, or please contact Pastor John, SPRC chair Dan Ward, or Council co-chairs Peter Smyton and Roger Whitehead.



Today: Week 3- The 21 Day Wesleyan Prayer Challenge

We will meet in the Concord Room and on Zoom at 9:45 am.

"The Wesley Covenant Prayer has been used in Methodist services around the world on the first Sunday of the year since John Wesley introduced it in 1755. Wesley expected that people would pray this prayer as a way of remembering, renewing, and surrendering themselves in complete trust to God. When we pray it, we are to remember what living like Jesus looks like and what loving God with all our heart, soul, and mind and loving our neighbor as ourselves requires of us.

In The Wesley Prayer Challenge, author Chris Folmsbee invites readers to consider words from the Wesley Covenant Prayer each day for three weeks while reflecting on their meaning in the context of the larger piece." From Abingdon Press

We invite you to take part in praying this prayer every day, even if you are not taking part in the class. As we head toward the Lenten season, may this prayer prepare your heart and spirit for a deeper faith and Lent experience ahead of Easter.
